Status of Kurdish collecting



Unevenly represented in United States research libraries

Some academic librarians have established collections in accordance with programmatic or librarian interests; however, generally not accorded status given to Arabic, Hebrew, Persian, or Turkish

Kurdish Studies underrepresented in Middle Eastern Studies

Why is Kurdish collecting important?



Kurdish is a major language of the Middle East

Library collections should not replicate colonial realities of Kurdish subjects

Collecting to support researchers beyond our institutions


Kurdish collecting at Penn



Some precedence with librarian and faculty interests; Kurdish language volumes numbered a couple hundred

Received institutional support for pursuing Kurdish collecting

Currently closer to 2,000 and growing; difficult to quantify

Beyond language: looking at identities, themes, geographies






